Portuguese government to help its citizens living in Venezuela

After a recent fact-finding visit to Venezuela, a senior Portuguese official reported he found "very serious shortages of food and medical care" in that country.

José Luís Carneiro, the Portuguese Secretary of State for Communities Abroad, says Portugal's government is

providing aid to needy Portuguese immigrants living in Venezuela and is ready to increase its support.

More than 50,000 Portuguese live in Venezuela, which is in the grip of a political and economic crisis. Many of them went there from Portugal's Madeira Islands off north-

west Africa and have lived in the Latin American country for decades.

Carneiro also stated that needy Portuguese returning to Portugal will also qualify for support. The recent return of several thousand Portuguese to Madeira has placed strain on public resources.

A celebration of Portuguese history and culture in Hartford

State Rep. Rosa C. Rebimbas (R-70) and Fernando G. Rosa, Director of the Portuguese-American Leadership Council of the United States (PALCUS) will be honoring Fernando Cordeiro, Fernando Rodrigues and José (Joe) Gouveia during the annual Day of Portugal ceremony at the state capitol on Friday, June 9, 2017.

This year, the Consul General of Portugal in New York, Manuela Bairos and the Tuna Académica da Faculdade de Medicina da Universidade de Coimbra (Portugal) choir, founded in 1888, will be on hand to celebrate.

This year's event will be held at 5:30 p.m. in the North Lobby of the State Capitol building located at 300 Capitol Avenue in Hartford. The event, which is free and open to the public, will feature Portuguese food and dance performances by the Rancho Folclórico do Clube Portugues de Hartford.

Fernando Cordeiro immigrated to the US in 1974, and with his wife Lucia has been a dedicated community contributor for many years.

His love for traditional folklore music and dance is the driving force for his devotion to the Hartford Portuguese Club's Rancho Folclórico dance company. Beginning as a Rancho performer, Cordeiro eventually rose through the ranks to become the Group's President; a distinction he has held for over 20 years. The Rancho Folclórico has enjoyed more than 40 years of continuous existence.

Fernando Rodrigues was born and raised in the village of Monsanto in Southern Portugal, then immigrated to Brazil, and later Hartford, in 1969.

He has been deeply involved in the community, serving as director of the Portuguese Club of Hartford, and has been the club's permit holder for more than 20 years. His immense dedication to the organization has seen him give many hours as a

volunteer in many different chores, including cook and bartender.

He has a great love for Sport Lisboa and Benfica, Portugal's top soccer club, and helped found Casa do Benfica (Benfica's House) in New Britain. He has the distinction of being Member No. 1.

Retired for several years from Hanson and Whitney he continues to volunteer for his favorite organizations.

Jose (Joe) Gouveia was born and raised in a tiny village in Portugal. Alone at age twelve, he moved to Lisbon, Portugal to seek more opportunity, and at age fourteen, he and his family moved to New Haven, Connecticut.

After moving to Wallingford, he became immersed in the com-

munity and held a variety of jobs and titles over the years. He was nominated for Outstanding Young Men of America and in 2007 was voted Connecticut Immigrant of the year.

One of his most recognized achievements is the beautiful Gouveia Vineyards that broke ground almost seventeen years ago. In the harvest seasons and daily winemaking practices, Joe still holds true to his Portuguese heritage and traditions.

Most recently, Joe and his family renovated the vacant historic building that housed Wallingford's first library and transformed it into a beautifully restored restaurant serving many Portuguese dishes.

The State Capitol reception was initiated in 2009.
